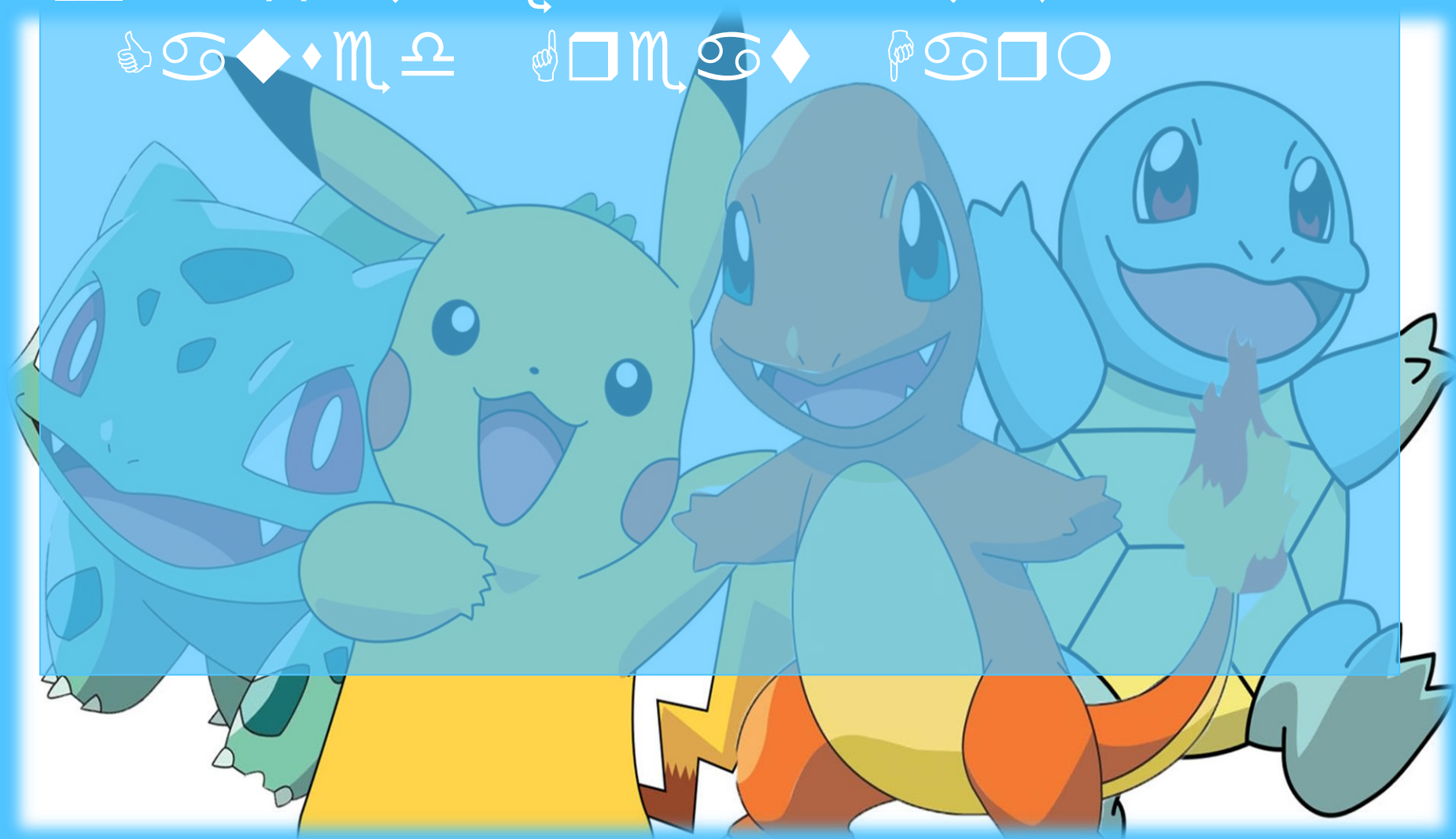

<sup>15</sup> Am I so short of madmen that you have to bring this fellow here to carry on like this in front of me? Must this man come into my house?”

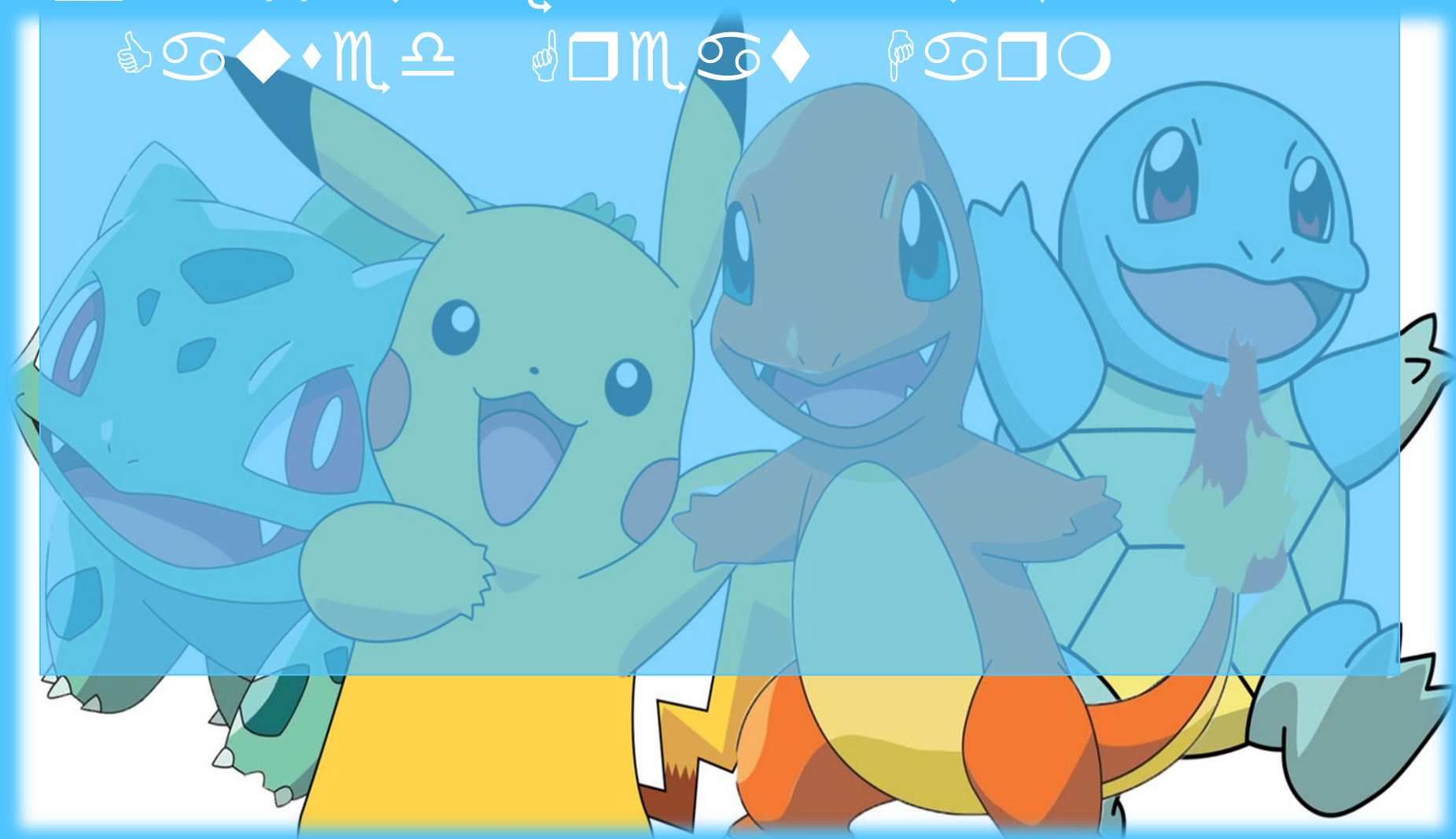

Ahimelek, you and your whole family.”





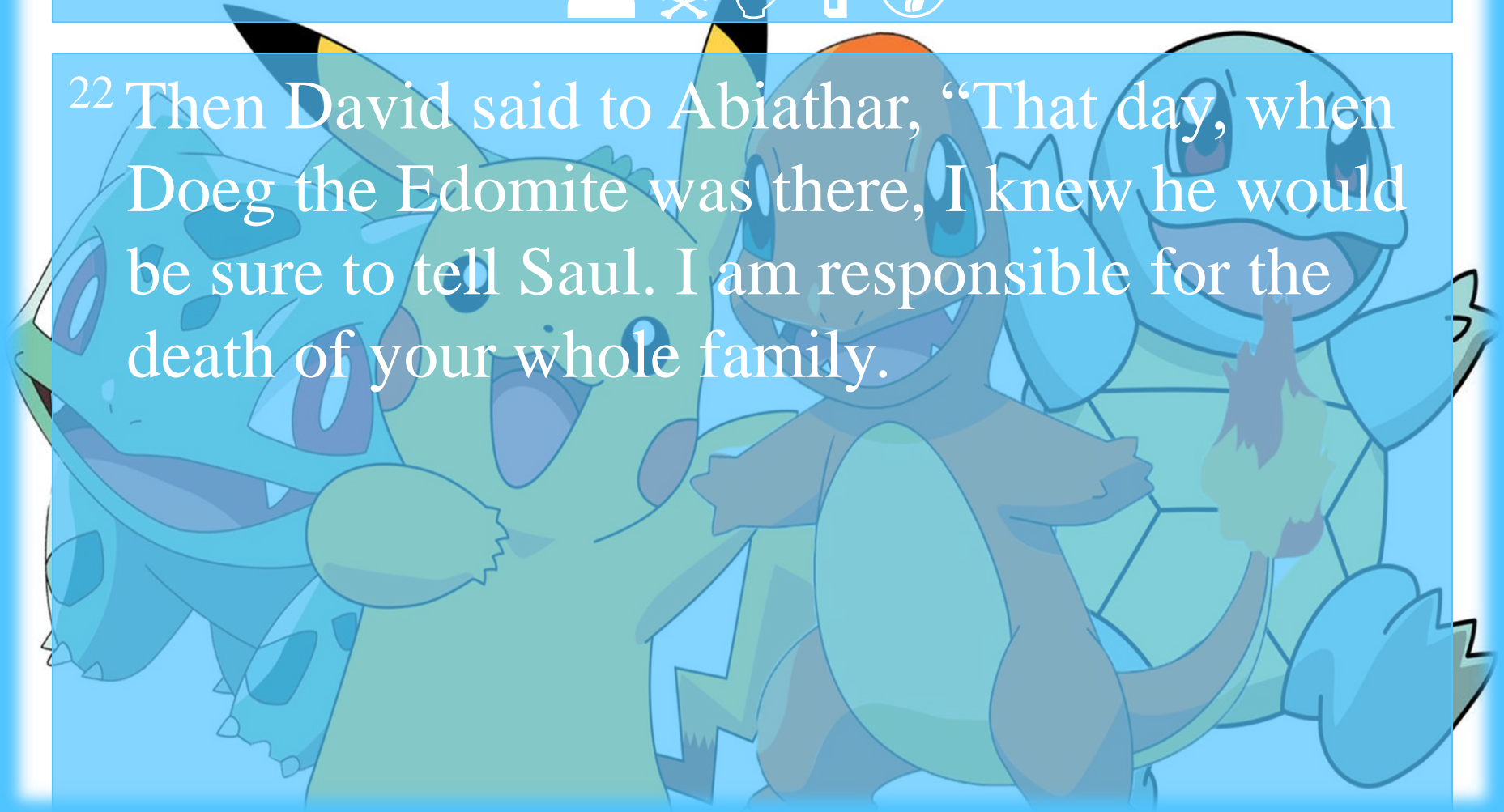
<sup>19</sup> He also put to the sword Nob, the town of the priests, with its men and women, its children and infants, and its cattle, donkeys and sheep.

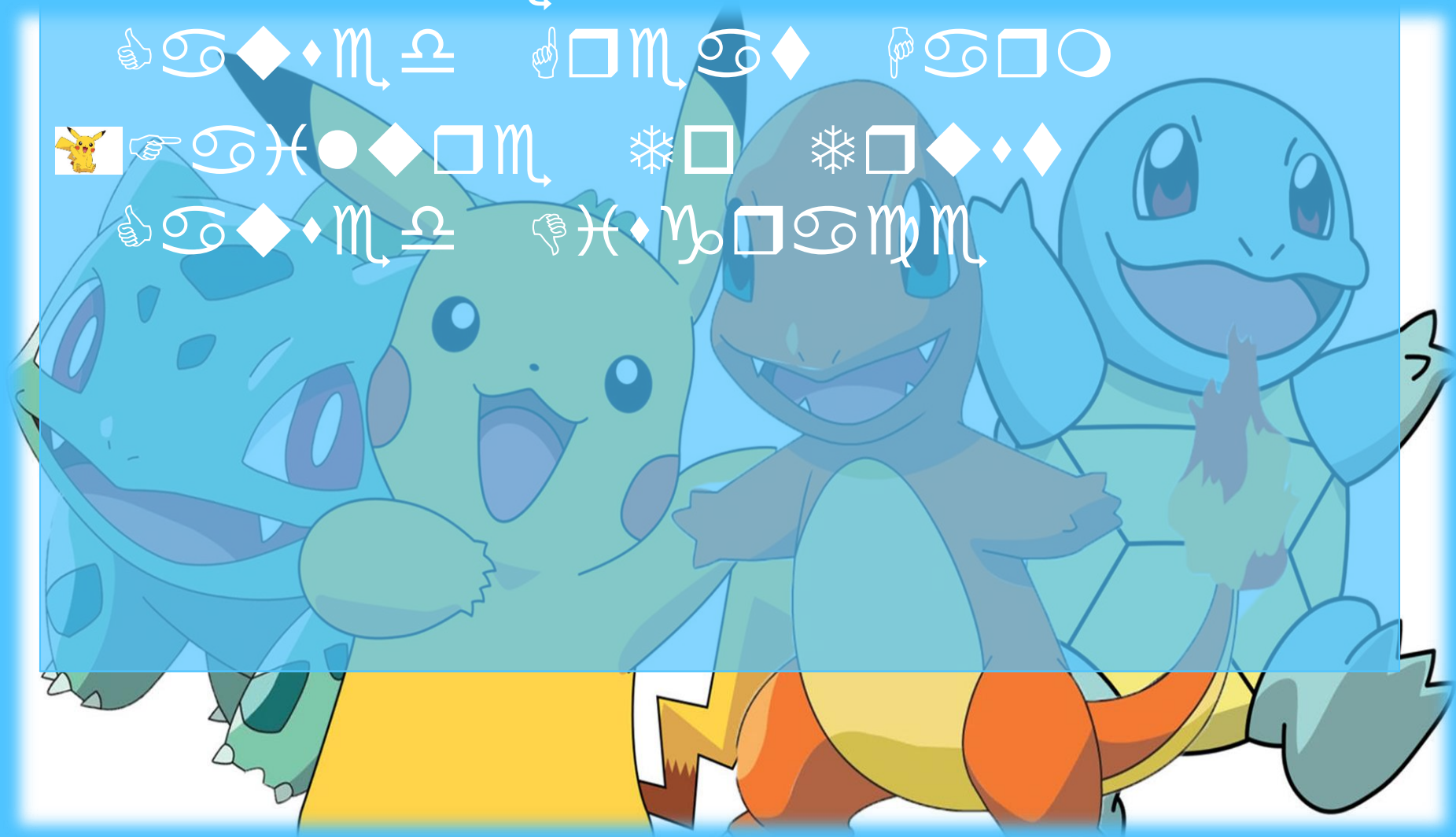






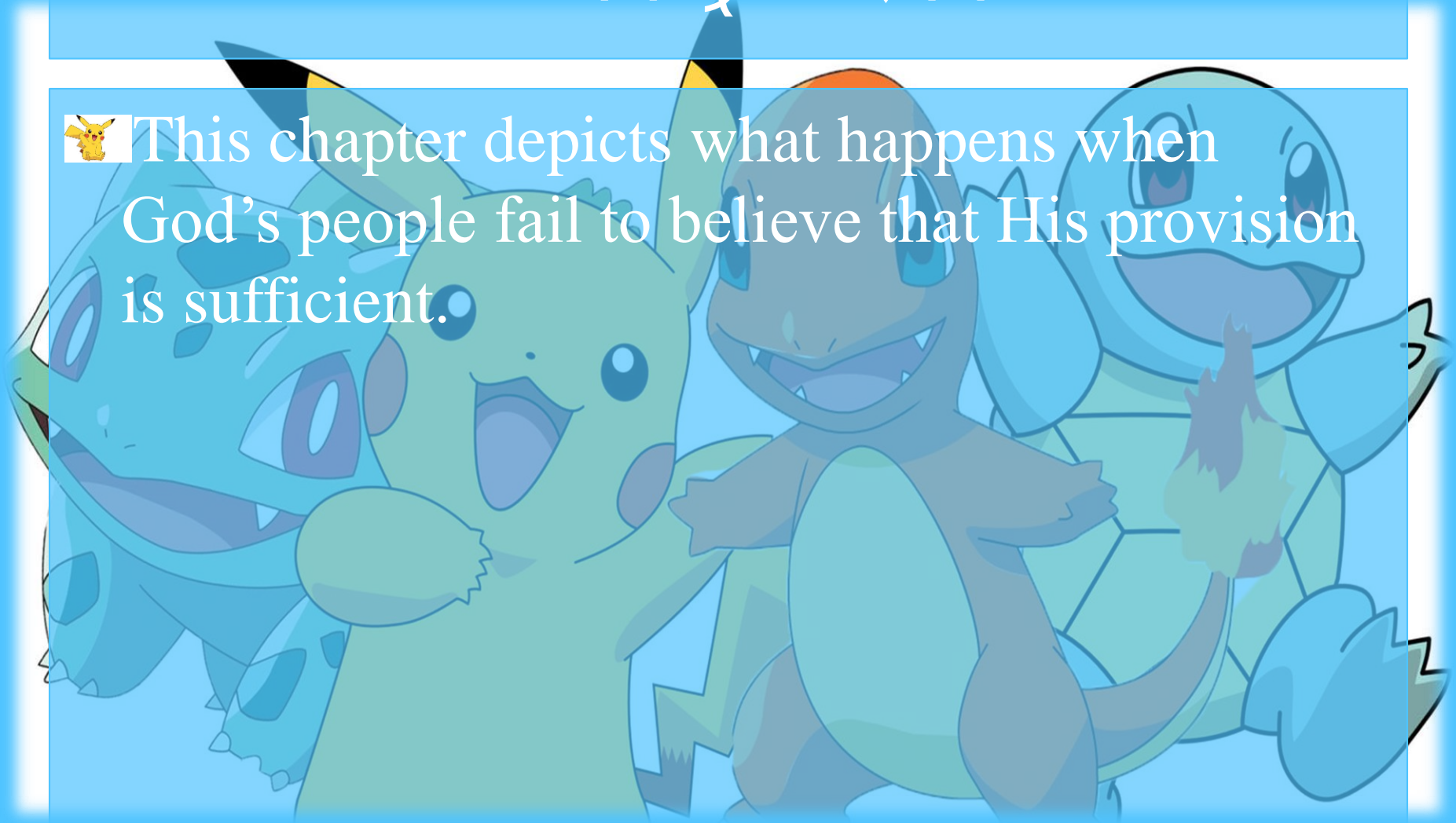

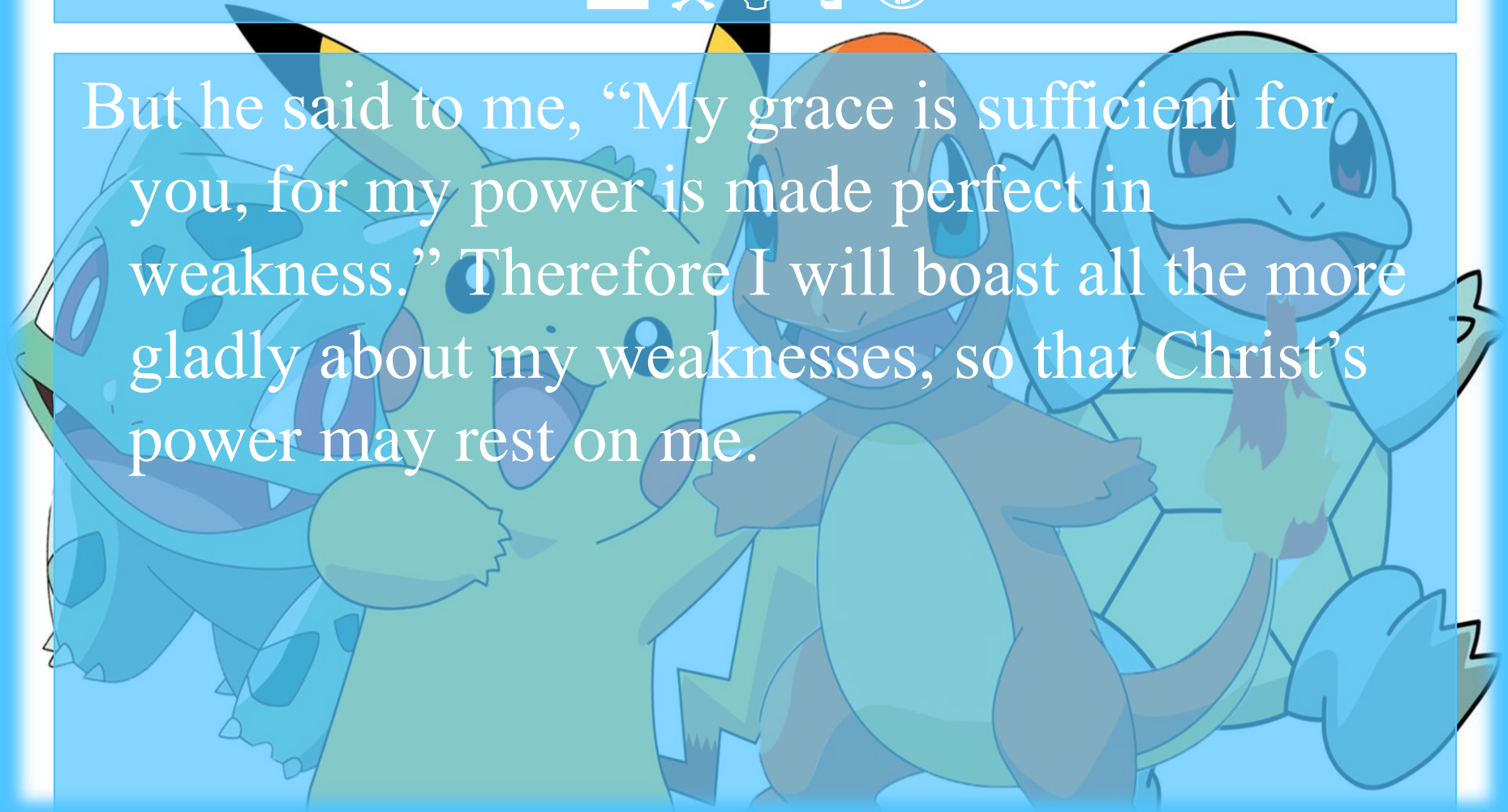
This chapter depicts what happens when God's people fail to believe that His provision is sufficient.
